They all convened in the Penthouse suite two hours before the votes would come in to deter-mine the fate of the men and women they spent

the last couple of months supporting.
"We are all hoping that we're going to fare very well tonight," said Dominick Episcapo, who resides in the north side of Syracuse.

The Republicans and friends of the candidates

mingled with each other, waiting for the local candidates to appear and give their victory speech or their concession to the other candidate.

Schumer's triumph excites **Democrats**

Looking towards the future, Onondaga County Democrats passed the election night with cheers and hopes of change.

The mood was optimistic as the night began at the Onondaga County Democratic election party at Hotel Syracuse. There were high hopes for candidates since the democratic areas of the district had relatively high turnouts, said Steve Paquette, chairman of the county Democratic committee.

The 120th district Assembly seat, was of partic-ular interest, said Paquette. The

race was expected to be close between the Democrat Bill Magnarelli and Republican James Corbett. The district covers two-thirds of the city of

Syracuse and Geddes, Paquette said. Well over half a million dollars was put into the campaign even though it only covers one-quarter of the county.

"It's a big race both statewide and for

The crowd cheered as Paquette announced that

both NBC and CBS had declared Democratic U.S Senate candidate Charles Schumer victorious at about 9 p.m.

I am so thrilled that we will finally have someone in the Senate, next to Moynihan, that we can be proud of," said President of the Syracuse Teachers Association, Kate McKenna.

Schumer is very good for education, said McKenna. He cares about a whole host of education issues, she said.

"He has had a good consistent record all the way through," said McKenna.

She said that the Syracuse Teachers Association worked very hard to make sure that incumbent Republican U.S. Sen. Alfonse D'Amato did not get re-elected.

"It restores my faith in the electoral process,"

The news at about 9:15 p.m. that Republican George Pataki had been re-elected passed quietly through the crowd without much mention.

At 10 p.m., the announcement was released that ABC, CNN and The New York Times had joined CBS and NBC in declaring Schumer victorious over
