Unranked in the preseason, Auburn jumped out of the gates with a 25-1 record, floated around

In fact, they may be the most athletic team in the nation. Leading the Tigers is forward Chris Porter, a JUCO transfer who became the 1999 SEC Conference player of the year. This surprised everyone in the nation except those from 'Bama who have been licking their chops ever since he signed with the team.

Need another surprise? How about sophomore shooting guard Scott Pohlman? He's a kid who looks more like the kid running the projector at practice than the SEC's most deadly three-point marksman

Auburn has already ripped the monkey of its back and beat it into the ground like many opponents it has faced. After a disappointing SEC tournament, the Tigers could be looking for some payback. Maybe taking aggressions out on their next-six opponents will finally get them some attention.

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

First-round shoot out in Hoosier country

Boeheim gives his team a vote of confidence before today's noon stand-off with the sharpshooting Cowboys in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

"There's nobody in the tournament that we can't beat if we play well," he said to the tape-recorders and the cameras while one of his players, Ryan Blackwell, sat next to him. "There might be an exception or two there. But certainly, we can play with anybody."

For starters, Boeheim and his Orangeboys will start the Big Dance in a hoe-down with Coach Eddie Sutton and his Cowboys today in the first round of the NCAA Tournament at 12:25 p.m. The Orangemen drew the eighth seed in the South Region. Oklahoma State is the nine-seed.

The exceptions Boeheim spoke about, of course, have to be Duke and Connecticut, the favorites to advance to the finals of the NCAA Tournament. But

the Orangemen need not worry about either team unless they happen to advance to the Final Four for the second time this decade and the fourth time in school history. Both the Blue Devils and the Huskies are the number one seeds in different regions.

"Nobody is looking to play Duke, I guarantee you," Boeheim said. "Every guy that was watching that board go up there was hoping they wouldn't be in the East. There's no question about that. They're the best team in the country.'

But that doesn't mean Syracuse has an easy road out of Indianapolis. The winner of this game will likely face first seed Auburn, considered the lesser of the four No. 1s, for the rights to advance to the Sweet 16 in Knoxville, Tenn. Auburn (27-3) stunned the nation by running the early part of its schedule before being knocked from the ranks of the unbeaten by Kentucky. The Tigers enter the tournament after losing to Kentucky in the semifinals of the SEC tournament. Since the


